




How I Discovered My Passion

History

The person who invented piano is Bartolomeo Cristofori (1655-1731) of Italy. He was unsatisfied by the lack of control that musicians had over the volume of the harpsichord (an old fashioned instrument played using a keyboard). He is credited for switching out the plucking mechanism with a hammer to create the modern piano in the year 1700.



How the Piano Got Its Name


The original name for the modern piano today was "clavicembalo col piano e forte" (piano means soft and forte means loud in Italian). Pianoforte is now piano.





Types of Pianos

3 different types of pianos: spinet pianos, which are the smallest pianos at 36" - 39" feet tall. Console pianos, which are usually 40" - 44" feet tall, and used at homes a lot. Lastly, Grand Pianos, which are under 5 feet, are used at concerts most of the time. These have the best acoustics out of the pianos.




How to Play a Piano

A piano works by pressing a key on it that causes a small hammer inside the piano to hit a string/strings. Each key is connected with its own hammer. When the hammer hits the string, it vibrates and makes a specific sound. These sounds are the different notes a piano can play.



The Piano Notes

When you play the piano, the sound it makes can be written down with musical symbols called notes. Some notes sound high and some notes sound low. Notes have letter names. The music alphabet only uses 7 letters: A,B,C,D,E,F, and G. These letters make up the language of the piano.






Famous Piano Players

- Ludwig Van Beethoven: He was born December 1770, Bonn, Germany. He died March 26, 1827, Vienna, Austria. He was a famous German composer.
- Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart: He was born January 27, Salzburg Austria. He died December 5, 1791, Vienna, Austria.
- Johann Sebastian Bach: He was born March 31, 1685, Eisenach,
 Germany. He died July 28, 1750, Leipzig, Germany
