



Upbeats

The first measure is *incomplete* — there are only 2 beats! These notes are called **upbeats** or **pick-up notes**.

Upbeats lead into the first full measure. Notice the last measure is also incomplete. Together, the *first* and *last* measure add up to 4 beats.
